Stronger or weaker together? Strategic dimensions of state behavior in cyberspace and its effect on international co-operation

Description: Many governments are operating in cyberspace as they are in other military domains. Some states openly discuss their offensive cyber capabilities, others stress the importance of reducing vulnerabilities and focusing on defensive measures. This panel seeks to stimulate a discussion about states' strategic view on cyber/information space in a time of increasing inter-state tensions and reduced international co-operation.

Securing Critical Infrastructures – What is the government’s role and how does effective Public Private Partnership look like?

Description: Critical infrastructures form the backbone of national economies and systems of government by ensuring the timely and seamless circulation of energy, information, goods, services and other necessities. This also makes them a prime target for threats stemming from cyberspace, and an important consideration for policy and decision makers dealing with cyber/ICT security and resilience. During the session, the panelists will discuss national and international efforts and good practices, for enhancing the protection of critical infrastructure, the role that different sectors can play.

Inter-regional best practice exchange on national incident classification systems – toward greater intercompatibility?

Description: States regularly classify cyber/ICT security incidents based on its severity, impact, urgency, and other parameters. While this can be observed as an entirely technical procedure, political considerations are becoming increasingly relevant when classifying cyber/ICT security incidents. This panel seeks to foster an exchange on national best practices across regions as well as stimulate a discussion toward internationally comparable classification schemata.

Moreover, several issues such as rules of responsible state behavior or confidence-building measures have been part of negotiations for many years and discussions are now also shifting toward implementation of those agreements. Based on the decision to create a new United Nations Group of Governmental Experts on Developments in the Field of Information and Telecommunications in the Context of International Security (UN GGE) and also an United Nations Open-Ended Working Group (UN OEWG) on the same matter, this panel seeks to discuss which issues need to be addressed by policy-makers and international organizations in the years to come.
