Regional Workshop on Cybercrime Units and Law Enforcement Capacities in Central Asian participating States and Afghanistan

11-12 June 2015

Almaty, Kazakhstan

CONCEPT PAPER **ANNOTATED AGENDA**

Background

This workshop will further implement the mandates set up, *inter alia*, by PC.DEC/1049. According to this decision, the OSCE “facilitates, at the regional and national levels, capacity-building and the exchange of information and best practices in investigating cyber crime and dealing with cyber evidence (...) in conformity with human rights, fundamental freedoms and the rule of law” and “assists the participating States in reaching the level of technical expertise required to join the G8 24/7 cyber crime network”.

The OSCE Annual Police Experts Meetings organized in 2008 and 2012 for all OSCE participating States and Partners for Co-operation, were devoted to “Fighting the Threat of Cyber Crime”. Participants, including experts from criminal justice institutions, academia and the private sector, highlighted the importance of developing specialized cybercrime units staffed with competent and trusted experts.

Since then, the OSCE Field Operations in Central Asia organized several activities dealing with cybercrime at the national level.

In 2014, the OSCE organized its first regional training for law enforcement officers in Central Asia on the topic. The practical one-week training course, devoted to “Computer Forensics and Network Investigations”, was attended by representatives from Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan and Tajikistan.

The 2015 workshop, organized in co-operation the Programme Office in Astana and in co-ordination with the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC), will aim to further improve the law enforcement capacities in fighting cybercrime, including through cybercrime units as well cross-border exchange of information in the whole region.

Structure of the Meeting

This workshop will enhance the capacities of law enforcement agencies in Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, Tajikistan, Turkmenistan, Uzbekistan and Afghanistan in investigating cybercrime, including through cybercrime units, as well as strengthen the information exchange mechanisms in the whole region.

Practitioners from relevant bodies of law enforcement agencies will elaborate on the current national and regional capacities to fight cybercrime. The target group for the workshop is:

- Law enforcement officers from the different agencies specialized in cybercrime investigation, including experts from cybercrime units,
- Heads of cybercrime units of the respective countries.

Moreover, criminal justice experts from the OSCE and UNODC executive structures and representatives of the private sector and academia will share their experiences in supporting cybercrime investigations.

Taking a forward looking perspective, the speakers and participants will be invited to elaborate on several concrete cases related to their field of experience. The aim of these discussions will be to explore the strategic outlook for the further development of the cybercrime law enforcement capacities in Central Asian participating States and Afghanistan. The main findings and outcomes of the meeting will be compiled in a report, which will serve as basis and guidance for further discussions on this topic at the national and regional levels.

The event will be held in Almaty on 11-12 June 2015. Simultaneous interpretation will be provided in Russian and English languages.
